## THE ONTARIO SCHOOL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

- The Ontario School Library Association (OSLA) provides a common voice for school library professionals needs and interests through advocacy, leadership and continuing education.
- **Over 1,300** elementary and secondary school teacher-librarians, library technicians and school board consultants are represented in OSLA.
- OSLA is a division of the Ontario Library Association (OLA) which is the largest library association in Canada, with over 4,000 members.



#### **THE ISSUE**

## SCHOOL LIBRARIES DRIVE STUDENT SUCCESS

- Literacy and critical research skills are foundational to STEM and other core competencies.
- Teacher-librarians serve as literacy leaders and provide support and expertise to the entire school, work with classroom teachers to achieve literacy and curriculum objectives.
- Access to a properly staffed school library is a proven part of student success.
- Literacy programs result in **better outcomes** on the Grade 3 and 6 EQAO assessments.



#### **THE ISSUE**

## **SCHOOL LIBRARIES ARE AT RISK**

- The Ministry of Education's new funding model eliminates protected funding for school libraries and library staff.
- The Ministry has **repealed accountability measures** intended to ensure library funding was being used as intended.
- School libraries face potential layoffs, reassignment of thousands of library professionals, or the departure of school library professionals from public schools altogether.



## **OUR RECOMMENDATIONS TO STABILIZE SCHOOL LIBRARIES**

- Update the Core Education Funding Model to create a defined sub-allocation for all school libraries and staffing funding, consistent with the provincial per-student formula;
- Update the Funding Model to fully protect these allocations; and
  - Restore the annual reporting and accountability requirements regarding school libraries for school boards and implement recommended enhancements previously submitted by the OSLA.

# THE "SAVE OUR SCHOOL LIBRARIES" CAMPAIGN

OSLA has taken action to highlight the sector's concerns:

- Direct advocacy with the Ministry and elected officials;
- The launch of the Save Our School Libraries campaign; and
- Media appearances on television and radio to discuss our concerns.



## **ENGAGEMENT WITH THE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION**

- OSLA has been actively engaged with the Office of the Minister of Education, Jill Dunlop, since the new funding model took effect.
- We continue to work with Ministry staff to share our concerns and explain how these changes impede upon their intent to support student literacy and success.
- OSLA will re-engage the Ministry once the Cabinet has been finalized & Minister of Education is confirmed.



## IMPACT OF THE PROVINCIAL ELECTION

- The provincial election happened on Feb 27, 2025, with Doug Ford being re-elected as Premier.
- Together, the Ontario Library Association and Federation of Ontario Public Libraries sent out **platform surveys** to the four major political parties in Ontario to seek policy commitments in support of school libraries and other sector priorities during the election period.
- Post-election: engage & educate newly elected officials (16% changeover); re-engage Minister of Education
